LOUD: A Ghetto Ass Rap Musical

Description:

LOUD: A Ghetto Ass Rap Musical tells the story of a young Black trans girl, Judah, who on her summer break from college tries to break through the rap industry in her hometown of Atlanta Georgia. We follow Judah's journey of finding not only the passion for her career but love for herself, her loved ones, and maybe a nigga or two along the way. All while meeting the wild and rambunctious people in her nook of Atlanta, we embark on themes of being seen, sexuality in the terms of what it may mean to love a trans woman, and what it means to exist fully in spaces that aren't exactly designed for you to succeed. While the city can seem so huge on paper, to Judah it can feel so small. We follow Judah's discovery of what it means to be earsplitting in a world not made for her to be heard. Through spoken word, rap, music, and dance we embark on a unique journey of self-love, identity, and Black authenticity that culminates into Loud: A

About Valentina Johnson:

Valentina Johnson was born and raised in Atlanta, Georgia, where she began her artistry at the age of 5. She is a recent graduate of The University of Alabama's BFA Musical Theatre program. Throughout her time at the university, she has received many accolades including but certainly not limited to The Tommy walker award. This award acknowledges the tremendous amount of work she has put in for the entire theatre department being its head of diversity equity and inclusion, student ambassador for newly enrolled artists, and the precedent for newly found organizations to create spaces for people like her who felt that they had no voice in such a white dominated space. This drove her to devote her artistry toward doing just that, creating art to drive the authenticity of Blackness onstage. Her very first production, "Cotton Candy," told the story of two queer Black men falling in love and the extremity of beauty that comes with that. Her continuous use of Afro-surrealism combined with a contemporary Black lens has been a staple in her repertoire and will continue to be a leading device in future productions including "Loud: A Ghetto Ass Rap Musical."

Made in America?

Description:

"Made In America?" is a satirical one-person play set in the gallery of a museum at an exclusive opening night of a controversial artwork: a single bloodstained brick. The play follows Andreas, the museum's curator, as he delivers an increasingly personal and politically charged monologue. What begins as a typical gallery talk unravels into a layered reflection on global trade, post-post-modern America, and the personal costs of national mythmaking. The brick in question is the last brick ever manufactured in the U.S.—a byproduct of a Chinese businessman's failed attempt to revive American industry during Trump's trade war. "Made In America?" is both an absurdist critique and a ghost story of globalization. It explores who gets to tell the story of America, and who pays the price for it.

About Yide Cai

Yide Cai is a poet, translator, and award-winning playwright from Shenzhen, China. His work has been featured at OOB Festival, BBTF, La MaMa, The Tank, Kanini Fest, and more. He is a fellow of the Laboratory for Global Performance & Politics, a member of TPOC Producing Cohort, and a scholar at Sewanee Writers' Conference. He is a MFA in Playwriting candidate at Boston University, and holds a BA in Playwriting & German Studies at Emory University.

Home Court

Description:

In the not-so-distant future, the state of Texas passes SB47, granting cities like Dallas the choice to opt-in to a measure allowing its residents to check their neighbor's citizenship status, and to detain and deliver any undocumented immigrants to ICE. Amid the backdrop of the Public Comment section of Dallas's Special City Council meeting, Abi Walker finds Luis Diaz practicing basketball on her affluent neighborhood's home court. After a contentious first meeting, the two high school seniors discover they can use each other's help fulfilling their respective dreams of playing for the UConn Huskies and getting a scholarship to University of Texas's pre-law program, until a shocking revelation leaves both of them guestioning



who they are and what they care about in the first place. A Romeo and Juliet with immigration reform, Home Court tells a story that's both timeless and frighteningly timely.

About Tori Weddell:

Tori Weddell is an Atlanta playwright and producer who believes that stories are the best thing about being stuck on this strange turning ball. She's the founder of ATL Original Works, best known for its performing arts variety show at PushPush Arts, and serves as the Development Coordinator for Atlanta Fringe Festival. In 2023, she wrote, produced and directed an immersive one-act house party called An Evening with the Fitzgeralds based on the lives and legends of Zelda and Scott Fitzgerald.
